ARTISTS INTEREST:

I operate a project-based Art practice. Each past public Art project has been different aesthetically, thematically, and have required vastly different technical skills. This has been an advantage however: First, I have the skills/experience to complete any project from large figurative bronze sculptures, to huge panels of steel and kiln-cast recycled glass. Second, other artists hire me as a fabricator and am therefore proficient in collaborating with a range of personalities, viewpoints, and needs. Finally, I often work in a site-specific manner; letting the context of the community and the site/project goals, dictate the final result. However, I often combine site-specifics with the semiotics of archetypes; universally understood objects or symbols and their related ideas, concepts, and meanings.

To achieve this paradoxical balance I use cutting-edge technology like laser-cutting, 3-D printing, and CAD modeling, with traditional aesthetics and methods of sculpture making. I think this focus on technology and construction of component-elements in my artworks fits like a glove with your project.

With such an adaptable and flexible Art practice, I often focus on site-specifics and client wants & needs. My approach to creating site-specific artworks is somewhat paradoxical; I operate under a consistent structure that maximizes creativity and flexibility: First, I visit the place in question and let the character of the area dictate its own inspiration. This often provides a visceral initiation for the creative blackbox of the artwork. Most of the time a site visit is enough to get the entire concept down. If a site visit is not possible, I conduct intense research to gain a better understanding of the area, its history, culture, industries, demographics, quirks, even topography. Second, I consider the use and context of the site itself. The aesthetics of agency and industry of certain places can often set a project in the right direction. Finally, I try to think down to the most minute yet characteristic detail of the site, context, or use; then isolate and magnify that aspect to a grand and monumental scale.

My preference is to create artworks that are beautiful and inspiring, but also interactive and informative.

I was in Architecture school for two years so I understand architectural drawings and spatial relationships. Furthermore, I've worked as a skilled carpenter, certified welder, and technical director of a theater; all jobs that require a sophisticated knowledge and experience working with architectural, engineering, and design specifications and drawings. This background also helps me understand the creative thinking, practical goals, and stress levels inherent in a public Art project.

To give you a sense of how well I work with large creative groups, the Washington Glass Studio (an arts group run by multiple directors who all wanted input) was so touched by how well I worked with them for the Bradley Blvd Safeway project and how much care and consideration I gave the piece, they personally asked me to create a new sculpture, entirely of my own design, for their 10-year anniversary show at one of DC's top galleries.

I have never been over budget on a project, I am obsessed with quality control during production, and even offer free maintenance and minor-damage repair on post-install artworks.

I look forward to developing and discussing more concrete ideas with your selection panel in the near future. Thank you for your consideration; I hope the selection process is a rewarding one!
