



Sallisaw Veterans Center

Sallisaw, OK | 2022 Corten Steel, LED Lighting | Each 'Wing': 30'L x 4' – 8'H Budget: \$350,000

Two 'wings' of Corten steel frame the monument sign for the veteran's center. Each 'wing' consists of two layers of seven panels equaling fourteen panels total, with every other panel laser-cut to expose the inner side of the opposite layer, thus creating visual depth and dimension as well as beautiful lighting effects. Each of the fourteen panels is an opportunity for content, which would be laser-cut. The content of these panels will be decided through community engagement and communication with the veterans.

Eternal Flame Monument

City Hall, Atlanta, GA | Projected Install: Winter 2021 Corten Steel, Stainless Steel, Concrete Main Fin: 52'8"L x 2'10" – 8'7"H x ¼"D | Secondary Fin: 41'6"L x 0'0" – 2'6"H x ¼"D Budget: \$600,000

The goal of this project is to create a space that expresses love, remembrance, and honor to remember the 30 youth and adolescents that were missing and murdered between 1979 and 1981 in Atlanta. Every one of the victims' lives mattered, and my memorial proposal is a testament to this community's commitment to never forget this tragedy, and to never forget these souls. I propose a space that not only includes an eternal flame with each victim's name displayed, but also takes a holistic approach by which we incorporate a memorial garden: a contemplative space that is quiet, respectful, solemn, elegant, and powerful.

Napa 9/11 Memorial Garden

Napa, CA | 2013 Salvaged Steel Beams, Glass | 25' H x 25 Budget: \$1,000,00

In a unique public-private collaboration, the citizens of Napa created the Napa 9/11 Memorial Garden to honor victims of terrorism and those who risk their lives to save others. The community received 30 tons of steel from the wreckage of the Twin Towers at the World Trade Center and the artist was commissioned to create the memorial structure. The resulting artwork has become a place for the community to engage in quiet contemplation and reflection. The memorial provides inspiration to continue to express the courage, caring and compassion the world experienced in the aftermath of 9/11.

In Honor of the Fallen

Oklahoma City Police Headquarters Memorial Oklahoma City, OK | 2017 Aluminum, Dichroic Glass, Fused Glass | 18' DIA, 70' pathway Budget: \$207,500

This installation is composed of six aluminum arches that curve towards one another, creating an uplifting gesture while pulling focus towards three memorial stones placed beneath, with a path along the plaza's axis. The words *Strength, Honor, Courage, Responsibility, Integrity* and *Respect* are water-jet-cut onto the surface of the arches, with an inset of blue and gold dichroic glass behind them, signifying the touchstones for the police force, and the colors of their uniforms.

End of Watch Memorial

San Jose Police Station San Jose, CA | 2022 Dichroic glass, steel | 8' DIA, 5" depth Budget: \$215,000

The City of San Jose commissioned Gordon to design the End of Watch Police Memorial to honor and memorialize San Jose Police Officers who have lost their lives in service to the public. The memorial features a seven-pointed police badge with an overlaid black metal band, a symbol often used by law enforcement to symbolize the death of an officer. The badge is eight feet in diameter and fabricated with dichroic glass, a glass that displays multiple different colors depending on lighting conditions and viewing angles. The work is enclosed in glass and mounted in a metal frame on a concrete plinth. Each fallen officer will be recognized on an individual plaque around the base of the memorial, which provides space for adding tributes in the future.

Luminaria

Steve Schiff District Attorney Building, Albuquerque, NM | 2021

Laser-cut, Rolled and Powder-Coated Steel | 7'H x 4'1" Dia., 8'H x 4'8" Dia., and 9'H x 5'3" Dia. Budget: \$223,650

Luminaria, a memorial for victims of gun violence, is named for the New Mexico illumination tradition of brown paper bags with cut-out patterns, consists of three different sized sculptures accompanied by five cylindrical seating components. Each sculpture's shape is inspired by the shape of a barrel cactus and is comprised of eight long "petals," which start at the base and curve up to connect at the top. Each of the petals is an opportunity for visual content, inspired by Mexican papel picado folk art and images of objects often found in spontaneous memorials created by loved ones of victims of violence. Each of the three sculptures are a different color, and illuminated from within, like the lanterns that inspired them.

Presence of the Past (rendering)

St. James AMEC Culture Crossing, San Antonio, TX | To be installed in 2024 Powder-coated, laser-cut commercial aluminum | 18.5' H x 36.5' W x 44.5' L Budget: \$750,000

Presence of the Past centers on the recently uncovered original foundation of the St. James AME Church, paying tribute to the narratives and contributions of the previously enslaved African American community that played a pivotal role in San Antonio's development and along the banks of San Pedro Creek. The design draws inspiration from the distinctive façade of the original AME Church as a testament to the lives, worship, and existence of those who once congregated in this space.

Tulsa, OK | To be installed in 2024 24 repurposed doors, painted murals, lighting, QR codes Budget: \$285,000

The concept of *Pathway to Hope* utilizes repurposed doors, lighting, QR codes, and paint. 24 repurposed doors acquired from the local community will be mounted to the walls, and the murals will be images selected through a Tulsa community engagement process. With this simple yet bold and straightforward

gesture, we seek to include and engage the community with iconic, familiar and visually arresting portraits of community members.

Remaining Awake – Cincinnati Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial (rendering)

Cincinnati, OH | 2022

Mixed-media, poured concrete | Various dimensions Budget: \$1,322,000

In January 2022, Gordon Huether + Partners, Inc. were short-listed as finalists for the City of Cincinnati's project, The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial. *"Remaining Awake Through a Great Revolution"* a speech Dr. King delivered to the 37th General Conference of The African Methodist Episcopal Church in Cincinnati on May 8, 1964, is the leitmotif of the Memorial, both its inspiration and its call to action. The proposal includes a magnificently sized bust of Dr. King and an infinity wall that would serve as a 'canvas' for the collected memories of community members and a place to grapple with the legacy of MLK Jr. A carefully curated selection of images, text and audio QR codes would engage, educate and inspire viewers. More intimate spaces for community activities and private contemplation were also included.

Santa Rosa VA Health Facility Pavilion

Santa Rosa, CA | 2022 Corten Steel, Stainless Steel, Dichroic Glass | 14'H x 12'W Budget: \$210,000

Huether created this pavilion for an exterior plaza designed as a place of reflection at the VA's outpatient clinic and to accommodate counseling. The sculpture exudes a quiet strength with its structural simplicity and selected steel material, yet its subtle play of light and shadow gives it a visual distinction that sets it apart from the facility's straightforward aesthetic. The pavilion sculpture offers a tranquil, contemplative, and immersive experience that aims to inspire and support the veterans and staff of the VA facility.



Sallisaw Veterans Memorial Project

Sallisaw, OK | 2022 Corten Steel, LED Lighting | Each 'Wing': 30'L x 4' – 8'H Budget: \$350,000

This commemorative structure for the new Sallisaw Veterans Center honors and respects our veterans, connects with the local community, and acts as a vehicle to educate and inspire. Commissioned by the Oklahoma Arts Council, the form of this art installation is taken from the context of the site and compliments the architecture of the Sallisaw Veterans Center. The two curved sculptural forms are roughly thirty feet long each. Both 'wings' of the sculpture are made of Corten steel and begin at eight feet at the tallest end and are four feet at the shortest end. Each 'wing' consists of two layers of seven panels, with every other panel laser-cut to expose the inner side of the opposite layer, thus creating visual depth and dimension as well as beautiful lighting effects and equaling fourteen panels total. Each of the fourteen panels provided an opportunity for community and veterans provided content, which has been laser-cut onto the panels. It was important to hear from the veterans, those who will use the facility daily. Numerous group sessions were held and other community outreach over the span of many months provided the inspiration for the final content of the panels.

9/11 Memorial Garden

Napa, CA | 2013 Salvaged Steel Beams, Glass | 25' H x 25 Budget: \$1,000,000

One of Huether's greatest experiences integrating public artwork within a civic space is the Napa 9/11 Memorial Garden. When the Napa Fire Department was offered 30 tons of steel from the wreckage of the Twin Towers at the World Trade Center to be used for a public memorial, the community sought Huether's leadership in conceiving a memorial sculpture and overseeing this \$1 million public-private project to completion. The memorial is constructed with recovered beams from the World Trade Center and laminated glass panels with printed vinyl inner layers that lists the 2,997 names of those who lost their lives that day. Sited in a large, landscaped plaza, the Memorial and surrounding garden are illuminated at night with an integrated LED lighting system. As the lead artist, Gordon worked with civic leaders, community members and private developers in conceiving and realizing the transformation of an empty city block into a significant public artwork and plaza erected in memory of those who senselessly lost their lives and the first responders who tried to rescue them. Additionally, Huether took the lead for many of the fundraising efforts for this project, the largest 9/11 Memorial in the western United States.

Old Hickory Community Center

Nashville, TN | Project under development Budget - \$250,000

A citizen selection panel composed of Old Hickory residents recently chose Gordon Huether to create a public artwork for the new Old Hickory Community Center. The panel selected Huether after review of a strong pool of candidates who applied to the call to artists. With a \$250,000 budget, Huether will design, fabricate, and install an interior suspended permanent public artwork for the new community center, based on feedback from community engagement sessions. Metro Arts, Nashville's public arts agency, organized two community events on October 10th and 11th, providing a platform for Gordon to engage with locals. These gatherings allowed the people of Old Hickory to share their deep-rooted love for their community and unveil what truly makes it a unique and cherished place. Huether was also able to do other outreach and research during this visit and meet with other individuals to learn more about what makes this heartwarming Nashville district special and to connect with the community for the upcoming art project, due to be completed in 2024.

Pathway to Hope

Tulsa, OK | To be installed in 2024 24 repurposed doors, painted murals, lighting, QR codes Budget: \$285,000

Huether works with artist and visual anthropologist Marlon Hall to honor those who lost their lives in the Tulsa Massacres of 1921. With this project, their goal is to reposition and honor the voices and experiences of generations of Black Tulsans who, despite horrific violence, urban displacement, societal ignorance, discrimination, and disregard, have survived, flourished, and embody the principles of hope, equality, and community. Pathway to Hope is an assemblage of images and sounds, art and stories, color and light that will result in a multi-layered experience for the viewer. The four underpasses of Elgin Avenue provide the opportunity for enlightening and multi-sensory experiences. The concept of Pathway to Hope utilizes repurposed doors, lighting, QR codes, and paint. 24 repurposed doors acquired from the local community will be mounted to the walls, and the murals will be images selected through a Tulsa community engagement process. With this simple yet bold and straightforward gesture, we seek to include and engage the community with iconic, familiar, and visually arresting portraits of community members. Presence of the Past, St. James AMEC Culture Crossing Park

St. James AMEC Culture Crossing, San Antonio, TX | To be installed in 2024 Powder-coated, laser-cut commercial aluminum | 18.5' H x 36.5' W x 44.5' L Budget: \$750,000

The Design Selection Panel received nearly 70 applications. Gordon Huether's proposal "The Presence of the Past" was selected. Planning for site visits and community engagement is underway with the permanent public art project slated to be completed and installed in September 2024. *Presence of the Past* centers on the recently uncovered original foundation of the St. James AME Church, paying tribute to the narratives and contributions of the previously enslaved African American community that played a pivotal role in San Antonio's development along the banks of San Pedro Creek. The design draws inspiration from the distinctive façade of the original AME Church as a testament to the lives, worship, and existence of those who once congregated in this space. This large-scale installation includes more than 300 names of original AME Church parishioners and features perforated metal with designs inspired by Freedom Quilts and others developed through collaborative workshops engaging current AME Church parishioners, San Antonio's youth, and the public, weaving together aspirations for the future and reflections of the past. Community engagement sessions are schedule for November and December of this year. From those sessions, Gordon and poet Laureate, Andrea Sanderson, will develop content for the artwork.
