
# Virtual Carlsbad Reads Together 2021

# About the 2021 Selections




#### **Educated** by Tara Westover

Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho and isolated from mainstream society, Tara Westover was 17 the first time she set foot in a classroom. Lacking a formal education, she began to educate herself. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her over oceans and across continents, to Cambridge, Harvard and beyond.

#### **Tara Westover**

Tara Westover is an American author. Born in Idaho to a father opposed to public education, she never attended school. She spent her days working in her father's junkyard or stewing herbs for her mother, a self-taught herbalist and midwife. Taught to read by an older

brother, her education was erratic and incomplete. She was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. After that first encounter with education, she pursued learning for a decade, graduating magna cum laude from Brigham Young University in 2008 and subsequently winning a Gates Cambridge Scholarship. She earned an MPhil from Trinity College, Cambridge in 2009, and in 2010 was a visiting fellow at Harvard University. She returned to Cambridge, where she was awarded a PhD in history in 2014.






# **Discussion Questions**

#### **Educated** by Tara Westover

- 1. Tara has titled her book *Educated* and much of her education takes place in classrooms, lectures or other university environments, but not all. What other important moments of "education" were there? What friends, acquaintances or experiences had the most impact on Tara? What does that imply about what an education is?
- 2. Westover eventually finds her voice and realizes it's just as powerful as the people who have influenced her life. What is voice, and how important is it that every child be encouraged to find their own?
- 3. How does education change Westover's view of her childhood? How does she come to terms with how she was raised once she knows the value of education?
- 4. Tara wrote this at the age of 30, while in the midst of her healing process. Why do you think she chose to write it so young, and how does this distinguish the book from similar memoirs?
- 5. What impact does Westover's pursuit of formal education have on her parents and family?
- 6. Ultimately, what type of freedom did education give Tara?
