Introduction

In recent years, the City of Carlsbad, like cities throughout California, has seen an increase in the number of people experiencing homelessness. Community members have expressed concern about the increasing impacts associated with this challenging issue, both to the homeless individuals themselves and to the surrounding community.

In response to increasing concerns from residents and business owners, in April 2021, the City Council decided to make reducing homelessness one of its top three goals for the 2021-22 budget. City staff was asked to create a work plan to support the City Council's goal, focusing on best practices and the measurable outcomes expected by the community. The City Council approved the work plan and allocated funding through the city budget process. The new budget goes into effect July 1, 2021.

Purpose of engagement

In preparing to implement the new work plan, city staff wanted to create an opportunity for community members to learn more about the new programs and strategies to reduce homelessness, provide input on how they are carried out, and address misinformation and answer questions from the community. This feedback will be provided to a new City Council Homeless Action Subcommittee, which will help guide the city's homeless response efforts.

How we engaged

City of Carlsbad staff worked with Dialogue Partners, a firm specializing in public participation and community engagement, to design and implement a public involvement strategy to engage City of Carlsbad community members and gather their input as the city plans to implement a broad package of intiatives designed to meet the City Council's goal of reducing the number of people experiencing homelessness.

Due to the COVID-19 public health order, in-person meetings were not conducted. However, interested participants were provided with the opportunity to engage and share their perspectives and feedback through virtual online meetings and an online engagement survey.

Virtual Community Meetings

Virtual community meetings included brief presentation and video about the city's current and planned homeless response efforts, gathering feedback via online polls, holding an open comment period, and responding to participant questions. One meeting was planned for each City Council district, with the City Council member providing welcoming remarks:

District 1: June 3, 2021
District 2: May 25, 2021
District 3: June 7, 2021
District 4: May 26, 2021

Online Engagement Survey

To encourage broad participation, the City of Carlsbad also invited community members to share their thoughts and input through an online survey.

Online Survey: May 27 – June 13, 2021

What we asked

Participants were asked a series of questions to help better identify their perspectives on the city's current and planned homeless response efforts:

- ► How do you get most of your information related to homelessness?
- ▶ What is one thing you know for sure about homelessness in Carlsbad?
- ▶ What is one thing you are uncertain about related to homelessness in Carlsbad?
- ► Have you or someone you know personally, ever experienced homelessness?*
- What questions do you have about the city's plan?
- ▶ What would you like the city/Homeless Action Subcommittee to consider as it moves forward with its plan?
- ▶ What ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness?*

Who we engaged


Carlsbad community members were invited to share their thoughts and perspectives on Carlsbad's Homeless Response Plan in the City of Carlsbad virtual community meetings and an online survey.

- ▶ 218 people attended four virtual community meetings
 - o 2 people attended all 4 meetings
 - 6 people attended 3 meetings
 - 15 people attended 2 meetings
- ▶ 427 participants completed the online engagement survey

District representation



Of those participants who indicated "other", the majority of responses indicated they observe and experience it firsthand while out in the community.


Online survey participants were also asked if they, or someone they knew personally, have ever experienced homelessness.

33% of survey participants indicated they, or someone they knew, have experienced homelessness.




Survey participants were also asked to identify their age. Of those that responded, the majority indicated they were 55 years or older (this demographic makes up about 40% of the city's population).

64% of survey participants were 55 years or older.



When asked how they might like to get involved in the issue of homelessness, the majority of online survey participants who responded indicated that would like to help correct misinformation in the community by learning about and sharing the latest studies and reports.

What We Heard

Following is a summary of themes that emerged from the meetings and survey feedback. This summary reflects feedback that was most commonly shared, although it's important to note that this was not a representative sample of Carlsbad residents, nor can we know to what extent the views of participants represent the views of residents overall. Verbatim responses are included in the Appendix.

A growing problem

Nearly all participants said homelessness is getting much worse in Carlsbad and see it as a big problem for the community, but recognized that other neighboring communities are struggling with the same problem.

Participants shared that they believe increased crime in Carlsbad stems from the growing homeless population, which negatively impacts community safety, wellbeing and resident's overall quality of life. Participants shared that they are often scared to use public spaces where individuals experiencing homelessness spend time. Many shared that they feel public spaces, such as parks, have become unsafe for their children and that local businesses and tourism are suffering as a result.

Urgency

There was a sense of urgency among participants to make a measurable difference in the problem of homelessness. They see it getting worse and are concerned that the city's work plan will take too long to implement.

Participants acknowledged that homelessness is a complex, sometimes not well understood and difficult issue. Despite this, participants indicated they would like more done to address it, although there was little agreement on what programs they thought would be most effective.

People want to know more about the problem

Throughout, participants expressed uncertainty around the scope of the issue. Many expressed wanting to know how many homeless exist within the community, whether they are from Carlsbad, how much crime is related to homelessness and why homelessness is getting worse. Many wondered to what extent mental illness and substance use contributed to homelessness.

Confusion and frustration about enforcement

Many participants seemed uncertain about what enforcement laws exist, what local and state laws influence how the city addresses homelessness and what enforcement efforts are being made. Many participants wanted to understand why police cannot remove homeless people from public areas and why encampments are not being removed. Some were aware of recent changes in the law that affect enforcement of camping ordinances. Overall, many expressed a desire for more enforcement, although some wanted enforcement that is not allowed, such as moving homeless to less populated areas (out of the city). Many felt more needed to be done about panhandling, public drunkenness, encampments, public urination and defecation, and people blocking sidewalks. Curtailing these activities would help decrease the negative impacts homelessness potentially has on local businesses and tourism.

Desire to help "legitimate" homeless people

Many seemed to make a distinction between those they perceived as not wanting help and those they perceived as simply falling on hard times. Most agreed the city should try to help those in the latter group, but there was some fear that the city's resources would be exploited or wasted by people who simply prefer to live on the

street. A fair number of participants felt those who "don't want help" were the biggest problem and did not see the city's work plan as effectively reaching them.

Concerns about Housing First

Overall, many participants raised concerns about the Housing First approach, which removes barriers to getting into housing so the person can first get access to services as quickly as possible. Having a safe place to live provides a foundation to more successfully address the issues that lead to becoming homeless. Some felt certain the Housing First approach would not be effective or cited studies showing it is not effective. Others expressed concerns that people would take advantage of the free housing and not work to transition into permanent housing. Another concern was that people would come from other areas to utilize Carlsbad's programs and therefore increase the total number of homeless in the city.

Skepticism of voucher programs

Concerns about voucher programs were similar to those around Housing First. Voucher programs allow certain people experiencing homelessness to stay in a hotel or motel with a specialized program in place that includes support services. Meeting and survey participants expressed concern that a voucher program would lead to crime in the surrounding neighborhood. Many wanted to know the criteria for getting a hotel voucher and how success of the program would be measured. Many noted concerns that they did not want to see a voucher program in or near residential communities, schools or where tourism and businesses would be negatively impacted.

Residents who live near hotels along Avenida Encinas cited many examples of recent crime and other behavior they attribute to homeless people staying at the low-cost hotels. Some believed voucher programs were already operating at nearby hotels and contributing to problems in their neighborhoods, including inappropriate behavior, drug use, nudity and people who appear to have mental illnesses.

Attracting more homelessness to Carlsbad

Several participants were concerned that approaches identified in this plan would lead to an increased number of people experiencing homelessness migrating to Carlsbad so they could access these services. Many felt this would also increase crime. Several were skeptical of the city's data showing the vast majority of people experiencing homelessness in Carlsbad lived in Carlsbad just prior to becoming homeless.

Timelines and measuring success

Participants had a keen interest in when the programs are expected to be implemented. Further, comments from participants indicated a strong desire to see measures for success established and assessed regularly to better monitor if, how and to what degree efforts being undertaken were achieving intended results. If not, how might services and programs shift to address failures? Many also wanted to see a cost-benefit analysis for the city's investment in homeless services.

Public input and decision making

Many participants asked if and how the public was engaged in creating the homeless response plan. Many felt they had expressed opposition to some of what is included in this plan and wanted to know how their input was considered in decisions made.

Scope of services needed to address homelessness

Participants recognized that those experiencing homelessness often need a myriad of services to address their needs. Many noted that they wanted to know what mental health, addiction and substance abuse services

would be made available to individuals enrolled in homelessness programs. Many saw this as a critical part of ensuring individuals expediting homelessness to address root causes that led to their homelessness. Further, many wanted to see clients engaged in employment opportunities to help them rejoin their communities in meaningful ways.

Costs/funding

Many participants wanted to better understand the true costs of providing these services, including if any costbenefit analysis had been done on the proposed approaches. Many wanted to know what portion of the plan was covered by federal grants and what portion local taxpayers would be responsible for to maintain this plan in the long-term.

Affordable housing

Participants seemed to agree housing affordability was a concern in Carlsbad, although some were skeptical that more affordable housing would reduce homelessness. Participants wanted to know what the longer-term plans for affordable housing look like; what the current need looks like, how many units would be developed, and how individuals and families would transition from temporary housing to more permanent housing solutions.

Community involvement, collaboration and volunteerism

Participants noted that they wanted to better understand what roles community organizations might play in delivering these services and how individual residents in Carlsbad might contribute to this work through volunteer efforts. Further, many wanted to know what regional collaboration was being planned or undertaken to support this plan and how it might contribute to more successful projects, approaches and policies to address homelessness.

Expand services that work, rethink those that don't

Many participants noted that there are strong community service organizations currently in Carlsbad (e.g., La Posada). Participants wanted to expand existing programs with a proven track record of success while potentially rethinking those that aren't achieving intended results. Further comments stressed the importance of using effective, evidence-based approaches to address homelessness.

Accountability, transparency and authentic communication

Participants would like the city to be accountable for the efforts being undertaken and regularly report back to the community on progress being made. Further, many participants felt that they would like to be more engaged in shaping future plans. Some suggested holding additional public meetings.

Collaboration

Some mentioned wanting the city to continue to develop plans and partnerships with other jurisdictions to create a more comprehensive approach to homelessness. Some expressed concern that the city was taking on too much of the responsibility for reducing homelessness and that should be led by the county or local non profits.

Civility and respect

Some participants expressed concern about a lack of respectful dialogue about the issue of homelessness during the town hall meetings. They wanted to see more empathy and compassion demonstrated toward those experiencing homelessness and toward those participating in the meeting who had points of view different from their own.

Next Steps

All public input gathered through the virtual town hall meetings and the online survey will be presented to the Homeless Action Subcommittee at its June 28, 2021, meeting. City staff will provide options for how programs could be adapted to address the feedback gathered.

The city will continue to keep those who participated in this public involvement process informed of how their input was used, what progress is being made to address homelessness, where participants can find research/studies and data related to the city's approach and additional opportunities to get involved.

Homeless Response

Online Survey Results May 27 – June 13, 2021



Introduction

With issues related to homelessness gaining increased attention, the city held four virtual town hall meeting in each City Council district to gather input from the public about a broad range of initiatives designed to address the City Council's goal to reduce homelessness.

To provide those unable to attend the town hall meetings an opportunity to provide input, city staff also created an online survey that was available May 27 – June 13, 2021. Questions in the online survey were similar to those discussed at the town hall meetings.

About the findings

The input gathered through this process is considered qualitative. It describes a range of perspectives that exist in the community, but responses cannot be generalized to the entire population with a known margin of error. The data below represent all participants and all formats (meetings and online survey), including some duplication, if a participant attended multiple meetings or took the survey and participated in the meetings.

Participation

A total of 427 people took the online survey.




Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?





Q8 Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?






Q10 Please select the category that includes your age.



Q8 Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?





Q9 How many years have you been a resident of Carlsbad?




Q10 Please select the category that includes your age.




Q1 What district of Carlsbad do you reside in or have a business in? (If you're not sure, click here)







Q8 Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?





Q9 How many years have you been a resident of Carlsbad?




Q10 Please select the category that includes your age.




Q1 What district of Carlsbad do you reside in or have a business in? (If you're not sure, click here)







Q8 Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?





Q9 How many years have you been a resident of Carlsbad?




Q10 Please select the category that includes your age.




Q1 What district of Carlsbad do you reside in or have a business in? (If you're not sure, click here)







Q8 Which of the following ways would you be willing to get involved in the issue of homelessness (check all that apply)?




