Reducing Food Waste in Carlsbad

Finding the Cause of Waste

Food waste is created in both the kitchen and the dining area of a food generating business.

- Kitchen waste can be generated through over ordering, overproduction, spoilage, trim waste, and more.
- Plate waste is affected by menu options, portion sizes, offer vs. request policies, food presentation, and more.

The **Food Recovery Hierarchy** established by the EPA helps guide priorities for managing excess food.

Benefits of reducing food waste:

The first step to reducing waste is understanding the **Why, What, Where, and How Much of your food waste.** Implementing a **waste tracking method** will give you the necessary insight to determine where action is needed.

Once solutions have been identified it is critical to get **buy-in from your staff** by creating an atmosphere that invites recommendation and input. Implementing a **feedback loop** between the front and back of house provides for continuous insight into further improvements.

Laws Around Waste

Laws Around waste		
AB341	Businesses generating over 4CY of solid waste must recycle.	
AB1826	Businesses generating over 2 CY of waste per week must divert organics.	
AB827	Businesses must provide organics and recycling bins and signage to customers.	
SB1383	Businesses must divert organics through edible recovery or by sending them to organics diversion facilities, given that their jurisdiction provides this service.

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Solutions to Waste



Purchasing

- 1. Adjust purchasing with demand and request flexibility from provider.
- 2. Practice consistent inventory management procedures.
- 3. Buy in bulk, Buy seasonal, Buy local.
- 4. Arrange to receive produce with cosmetic imperfections at a reduced cost.



Storing

- 1. Understand best storage and handling for each item and implement solutions to elongate usage (freezing, dehydrating, etc).
- 2. Make sure all staff are following "first in first out" storage process.
- 3. Implement a descriptive labeling system.



Preparing

- 1. Refine knife skills to reduce waste during trimming and cutting.
- 2. Utilize 'root to stalk' and 'nose to tail' methods to get the most out of your ingredients.
- 3. Implement just-in-time systems to reduce overproduction.



Menu and Serving:

- 1. Identify and drop poor performers.
- 2. Maximize cross-utilization of ingredients across menu items.
- 3. Repurpose leftovers into new dishes.
- 4. Offer seasonal dishes and specials to utilize ingredients before spoiling.
- 5. Reduce portion sizes and garnishes
- 6. Ask if customers are interested in sides and complimentary appetizers rather than automatically serving them.



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Food Rescue Options

FOOD DONATION

After implementing the measures to reduce the volume of surplus food, the second most preferred option to deal with excess food is donation.

By donating food, businesses can:

- ✓ Help the local community in need
- ✓ Save money through tax incentives and reduced waste hauling fees
- ✓ Transform waste to a resource
- ✓ Prevent organic waste from going to the landfill

Tax Incentives

If your business donates food to a charitable organization, you can potentially claim a deduction. Your business must generate taxable income and retain a donation record from the charitable organization. To learn more, access <u>Tax Deduction for Food Donation: A Legal Guide</u>.

Steps to set up food donation:

- 1. Identify type and amount of extra food
- 2. Determine packaging, labeling and storage requirements
- 3. Understand frequency of donation need
- 4. Select a food rescue partner
- 5. Establish the process and transportation plan. Maintain logs of food donation
