Thank you for meeting and for your efforts to keep our children safe while walking the fine line of preserving the rights of the families and children in your districts.

Agenda item #4: With regards to COVID-19 positive cases and comparing the YOY numbers, how do you factor in the difference between last year's access to testing and this year's? For example, as the majority of cases in children under 12 are mild, I am of the opinion that the issue seems escalated as compared to last year in part because more people are being tested (whereas they did not get tested last year while at home with mild symptoms). Perhaps you have a perspective of how that is taken into account from a mathematical perspective, to combat the possible data bias of comparing apples to oranges. I am emphasizing that, yes, the cases this year are real, but the delta between this year and last year may create a false narrative.

Additionally, with Agenda Item #5, how do you combat the possibility of re-enforcing race division or inadvertently teaching shame and disempowerment? It is very possible that Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is a haven for CRT proponents who may want to harm our children based on the color of their skin. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are important. Guarding against the racism of CRT is also important. What strategies do you have in place?
